The on water volunteers have been committed to excellence in race management and are an important part of our ability to go sailing. We host the most and biggest Charity regattas on the Harbour and continue to raise money through the generous donation of boats and time to our skippers. Our feature events and in particular the Sydney Harbour Regatta and SSORC continue to show how our committed sailing staff and our volunteers can professionally come together and run successful events. One feature event gaining great support is the annual Women's Regatta which was a great success with 23 boats in a highly competitive fleet.

The board and flags have used the 80th year to reflect on the past but now focus on the future and the next 80 years. Through a strategic planning process the board has launched several new initiatives. Following the establishment of the new constitution last year a new strategic plan has been developed. Integral to this is to form a strategic advisory board. This group is looking to develop a plan of strategic renewal of the club and the precinct to set our future for the next 80 years. It's is hoped that plans will be developed over the next 6 - 12 months that can be proposed to the members to gain support and input. From there, sometime in the next 7 to ten years the financial backing to develop these plans will be put in place with a view to implementation. To address the financial aspect of the club's future we have launched the Middle Harbour Foundation which will aim to raise funds for club development and facilitate member development through Frank Likely grants and other grants the trustees see fit to approve. These long term plans will be subject to regular updates for members to understand and give input. These are exciting initiatives.

We are in the meantime committed to continually improving our club and facilities. It is hoped to makeover the Harbourview room this winter to modernise and improve our function capability. Further we will be engaging in some major refurbishment of our marina. These are not insubstantial costs but necessary ones. We, in conjunction with the Foundation will be looking to raise money through donations, bequests and fund raising.

I commend the 80th celebration Commodores dinner this year to be held on Friday June 21st. We invite you to this event which will be very special in terms of scale and entertainment. We continue to look for items that can be auctioned and sold or raffled to help with the fundraising. This is of course an important event, but we are hoping to make every event a celebration of our 80th year. Some events that are nearing are the Seniors lunch and the Long Lazy Lunch. Keep an eye on the news to learn more!

Further work has been carried out focusing on our present and future sponsors. Our sponsorship committee is looking to develop our offering to sponsors. This ties to our social media and the need to develop our social media. We are needing member help to point us toward potential sponsors that we can approach and present to. Without the support of sponsors we don't go sailing and the sponsorship dollar is an ongoing challenge for the club.

Sadly we have lost a few members over the last quarter. They were all characters and volunteers at the club. They will be sadly missed but always remembered. Unfortunately death is part of life, but it is a great sadness when it comes.

Our club is in an exciting era. We continually face challenges, but the club and the spirit of the club and volunteers is palpable. Six out of the sixteen boats in **Performance Racing Division 1** were from MHYC. Winning the series by just one point was *Lightspeed*, (Stephen Barlow), *Swish* (Stephen Proud) was third and *Lazy Dog* (Shaun/Quentin Lane) was fourth. Also sailing were *Little Nico* (Adrian Walters), *Q* (Ian Oatley) and *Thirlmere* (Mike Logan).



That division was also racing for the NSW Super 12's Championships and MHYC was placed in the top five of the six boats.

In Performance Cruising, *Samarkand* (Walter Carpenter) was third in Division 1 and *Mortgage Choice Rumba* (Robert Carr and Kerry Burke) was second in Division 2. Also sailing in Performance Cruising were *Kayimai* (Rob Aldis), *Macscap* (Peter McClelland) and *Buggalugs* (Jeremy Clark).

In the Commodore's Cup which is held on three days beforehand, MHYC also came away with some excellent results.

Botany Access Cocomo (Jim Thomas) has won the Non-Spinnaker Division of the three race Commodore's Cup series in the

11 boat fleet. In the 22 boat **Spinnaker Division 1**, *Tempo* (Michael Smith) was 2nd overall, just one point behind series winner *Yarrandi* (David Griffith CYCA) while *Advanced Philosophy* (Mark Hendry) was 3rd, *Lumiere* (Warwick Miller) 4th and *Kayimai* (Rob Aldis) 8th. *Mortgage Choice Rumba* (Rob Carr & Kerry Burke) won the 23 boat Division 3.

Samarkand (Walter Carpenter) also placed third in the RPAYC Pittwater to Port Stephens Race leading in to the event.












Youth Sailing

The Summer Season for MHYC sailors was very productive with our own Max Paul and Archie Cropley coming home with National and Youth championship titles in the summer holidays. Having started in the Opti's, these guys are now at the top of the tree in the 29er program and poised to continue in the next class they take on. Our Opti and Cadet sailors also travelled and came home with top 10 results in many events both locally and interstate which was great to see.

Youth sailing has now entered the off season; however it does not stop and we have a keen group of 15 sailors on a Sunday still doing the Learn to Sail Program of Tackers (7-12) and Teens (13 - 17). Both groups have been taking advantage of the warm Autumn weather and more consistent breeze to hone their skills.

Our Optimist program has had a large boost with the introduction of Brewer racing lead by the Australian Optimist Coach Rob Brewer offering training sessions on Thursday afternoon and Saturdays. Over 18 kids are doing these programs and its great to see the Opti's lined up on the beach and the keel boat stars of tomorrow training and racing hard out of our club. Both 29er and Cadets are currently realigning the crews but will be back on the water and training for the club with upcoming development programs. The deck is of course too small!

The use of club pacers for the school's program has seen numbers expand and 3 schools sailing over the summer Term 1 and Term 4 out of MHYC. We have had a few changes in staff with the departure of Andrew Phillips who has been of great assistance with the structure and operations of the youth sailing. He has left in place an enhanced management system for the instructors and Sailing Manager and will be greatly missed. We will hopefully have positive news on the Head Instructor role in the coming month....stay tuned.

We are holding a presentation and information evening on Sunday June 2^{nd} at 4pm after Race 1, 2 and 3 of the winter series. A BBQ dinner with a heap of information on the events planned for the upcoming summer season. Rob Brewer will also be presenting his program for the 2019 – 20 season.

Finally we are looking to re-energise the Youth Sailing Committee and need involvement from parents to make this happen. All we are asking is one 1hour meeting every 2 months plus your input to make sailing for the kids great. Please talk to myself, Karen or David if you are able to assist.


MHYC 80th Anniversary Presentation
