PRESENTER: PHIL DARLING – QUALIFICATIONS, THE ICC AND OTHER REQUIREMENTS FOR CHARTERING

Chartering requirements, especially for holidays outside of Australia, are becoming more difficult and increasingly you are being asked for evidence of competency. If the charter is in the Mediterranean, or in other European venues, this may be the dreaded "ICC". If you are going inland (say – canal boating) you may also require a "CEVNI".

Phil will take you through the various chartering requirements including what the "ICC" and "CEVNI" are, when you need them and how to go about getting them.

As well as being a long time Cruising Division member, Phil is a Yachtmaster Instructor and examiner for various overseas qualifications including these two. He will also place them in the overall context, from beginning to sail to Yachtmaster, and comparing commercial and non-commercial requirements in Australia and overseas.

The Wachman Award was relaunched during the June Cruising Division meeting, An exciting new format aimed at equipping the alternate skipper with the skills needed to confidently navigate a sailing vessel to safety unassisted if the need The new manual has arises. exercises in: 1) Knots and Marks, 2) Boat Handling, 3) Safety (VHF and MOB) and 4) Sail Handling. Once you have worked through a series of self assessed skills, each level attained is engraved into your own Wachman achievement plaque.

On the club awards night each year members who have completed all four stages of the Wachman award and received their achievement plaques during the year will be in the running to have their name added to the Wachman trophy as most improved.

This is for everyone, alternate skippers and skippers alike who want to brush up on the skills required for single-handed sailing.

THE AFTERMATH OF CYCLONE PAM. MARCH 2015 VANUATU. BY MIKE MCEVOY



Carnage from Cyclone Pam in Port Vila, Vanuatu

Recently we travelled to Vanuatu for a mid-year break for Sara. We had planned to do this last year but Cyclone Pam got in the way. Cyclone Pam ripped through the islands of Vanuatu in March 2015, causing massive devastation. It was classified as Cat 5, no, not Cat 5 safety, a Category 5 cyclone. Maximum wind speeds over 108 knots. Port Vila recorded wind speeds of 116 knots gusting to 185 knots between 2200 on Friday 13 and 0200 on Saturday 14 March as the eye passed to the east. The resort on Efate (the main island), about 30 mins drive north of Port Vila, had been severely affected by the cyclone. Fortunately the airline (Air Vanuatu) "held good" our tickets for 12 months so we re-booked for end of May into June. The resort "The Havannah" on Samoa Point, Port Havannah, was very happy to hold our booking over. So five nights and six happy days of bliss awaited.

Day one I went for a sail on a Hobbie Cat, available as part of the free marine equipment at the resort. Port Havannah is created by two islands, Lelepa and Moso which, in effect, make a safe harbour. A harbour big enough that it held the US 7th Fleet during WWII. The remains of the seaplane hangers are still there albeit overgrown.

On that first sail my objective was to get closer to a large yacht lying on its side at the northern end of the harbour. The breeze was from the NE at 10 to 14 knots and it took me about 1.5 hours to reach the yacht. The yacht turned out to be the ketch Blue Gold, a charter yacht of 50 metres that had been caught in Cyclone Pam. She was on her starboard side up on the coral with her masts over the land she was that close to shore. Both anchor chains could be seen extended so I assume that they had been deployed but did not hold her, with the cyclone forcing her up on to the coral reef, which runs just off the shore of Moso Island. Rumour from the locals is that Blue Gold is owned by an Australian who is in jail, which might explain why the yacht has not yet been salvaged. On the Efate shore about 400 metres from Blue Gold is a pile of equipment which looks like an army engineers' pontoon bridge, perhaps in readiness for a re-floating when the time is right. Given the carnage in Port Vila, Blue Gold was lucky.

The next day I went for another sail, this time taking my camera inside double ziplock bags to keep the water out. Just as well I had the camera protected because the only place to store it on the cat was in a pocket on the trampoline. This time the NW breeze was a bit stronger but constant so I was able to get to the Blue Gold in about 45 minutes on three tacks. I deliberately sailed about 500 metres past her so that I could run downwind to take the photos you see here.

Given Blue Gold has been on the coral for 15 months she is in remarkably good condition and does not seem to have been picked over for all the equipment on board. Apparently someone sleeps on board and there must be some sort of security guard, possibly the local villagers. It is such a waste of a beautiful vessel but she does provide a point of interest in an otherwise beautiful harbour that has so few boats on it, compared say to Port Vila.

LAUDABLE ENVIRONMENTAL INITIATIVE IN NOR FOR 2017 AROUND AUSTRALIA RACE PLASTIC BAN

Ian Thomson is a sailor and educator who is passionate about getting plastic out of our oceans – and I think we all applaud that initiative. As organiser of next year's Around Australia Yacht Race, Ian has inserted some very good regulations in the NOR. You won't be able to use plastic bags to supply the vessel and one-use plastic bottles are also banned. Instead Ian suggests a large container of water and repeat-use metal bottles for each crew member. Ian's regulations make sense for all ocean racing and cruising boats – please read the article if you need to pick up a few ideas.

There will also be a limit on the amount of diesel able to be carried for recharging batteries, so alternative methods will need to be used. Hydrogenerators have been carried on Round World racing yachts recently and for those contemplating the Around Australia Race or just planning a bluewater cruise, I've attached some details on a product I spotted at Southern Seas Marine on the Gold Coast a few months ago. CD Quiz – July 2016 – Answers

- 1. A "Tidal Gate" is an area where safe passage is much easier if you work with, rather than against, the tide. For example, Solway Pass (between two of the Whitsunday islands) is much safer and easier to pass through on Slack Water (ie at the top or bottom of the tide) rather than at mid tide when strong currents and overfalls are common.
- 2. An Overfall is a turbulent stretch of water caused by a strong current or tide. It may be from a meeting of currents, or from an effect from the shape of the sea bed.
- 3. Clearance heights overhead are usually taken from HAT (Highest Astronomical Tide). Check the chart notes if in doubt.
- 4. The sea breeze off Sydney starts from the east, then backs to be more north-east as it strengthens during the day.
- 5. Leeway.
- 6. Neaps the moon and the sun are working in opposition in their tidal influences.
- 7. The vessel is aground.
- 8. Both are two masted sailing vessels, with a main mast and a smaller mizzen mast aft of it. The ketch has the mizzen mast forward of the rudder post, and the yawl has the mizzen mast aft of the rudder post.
- 9. This is an isolated danger mark, so in daylight it has alternating black and red bands, and a top mark of two black balls
- 10.At the back end of a sail. It is the curved area of the sail outside of the line from head to clew.
